



**At the end of the lesson, the student will be able to:**

\* discuss what they think about panhandling and why do they exist; suggest ways on how it can be lessened or totally eradicated.



**Read the Passage:**

This is my experience with a “homeless” man carrying a large “Will Work for Food” sign. He was **living in the bushes** behind my husband’s place of employment. When police arrested him for **trespassing** and **vagrancy**, they found \$1,000 in cash in his pockets. He told the police he had made the money by standing at a busy **intersection** in the town with one of those signs. He also said he could never earn that by working, because he takes in \$500 to \$600 a day just holding up that sign. Think about this: If one person gave you a dollar every time the car had to stop, and the signal changed 30 times an hour, and you stood there for eight hours a day, you could make \$240 a day. Realistically, the **figures** are probably much higher. I recently saw a family standing at a busy intersection holding these “homeless” signs. Not only is this activity dangerous, it’s also an emotional **blackmail**.
