




- A: Good evening, Elly. I heard tomorrow is your entrance exam for the university.

When to use HAVE TO

We use <u>have to</u> when something is necessary and you have no choice.

Ex. The circus is not for free so we <u>have to</u> pay \$5 each to watch the show.

Tomorrow is my long exam, so I *have to* study.

However, we use the phrase <u>don't have to</u> when something is NOT necessary or required.

Ex. I *don't have to* clean my house on weekdays.

Mrs. Smith doesn't have to send her son to school who is badly ill.
